



**1 Yakaya by Troy Pillow 2010**  
**Did you know?** This sculpture is appropriately located near the best spot in town to start your float along the Deschutes River. You'll notice the kayaks form flower petals & the paddles form the stamen.

**Q:** How many kayaks are used in the creation of this piece?



**6 Bueno Homage to the Buckaroo by Danae Miller 2005**  
**Did you know?** This piece was created using a lost wax cast. The name of the sculpture comes from the artist's husband, who was a buckaroo with a horse named Bueno.

**Q:** Which end of the horse is raised in this sculpture?



**2 Sound Garden by Lee Kelly 2010**  
**Did you know?** The three pieces are designed to represent the shapes of organic musical notes.

**Q:** There are 2 giant trees in this roundabout. What kind are they?



**7 Earth Song by Bruce West 2005**  
**Did you know?** Some people say this piece looks like lightning bolts, while others suggest the burnished stainless steel spires seem to vibrate with force from the earth. This was a tribute to this good earth we all have & share.

**Q:** How many spires appear in this piece?



**3 Lodestar by Roger Berry 2009**  
**Did you know?** When you're coming around this roundabout and starting to head west, you can catch a phenomenal view of the Cascade mountain range including a spectacular look at the Three Sisters.

**Q:** Depending on the angle you view it from, this sculpture looks like a number. Which number?



**8 Orb I by Brandon Zebold 2005**  
**Did you know?** The detail in this piece is easiest to see when it's covered in dew or frost. Some think it looks like a giant bowling ball. The artist used an oxyacetylene torch to cut the designs in this six-foot sphere.

**Q:** If the orb were a bowling ball headed toward the center of the roundabout, what would it hit?



**4 Evolution by Troy Pillow 2008**  
**Did you know?** This is one of several kinetic sculptures along the Roundabout Art Route, as the pieces are designed to move with the wind.

**Q:** How many green circles are used in this piece?



**9 Migration by Hal Ying Wu 2004**  
**Did you know?** Many of the Roundabout Art Route sculptures were designed to represent the area in which they're placed, & this one is no exception. The birds taking flight are intended to symbolize the journey of the college students nearby.

**Q:** If the birds continued their chosen flight path, what would they run into?



**5 Might of the Work Force by Devin Field 2005**  
**Did you know?** This piece is reminiscent of the role of the draft horse in the early mill operations around Bend. This piece had to be reconstructed in 2007 after it was hit by a car.

**Q:** Which leg is the horse raising?



**10 Centennial Planter by Jerry Werner 2004**  
**Did you know?** The year this sculpture was installed was the year Bend turned 100. Its proximity to the old log deck along the river is a tribute to the area's history in logging.

**Q:** What creature sits perched on the south side of the planter?

# pillars of art

The Bend Visitor Center is covered in graffiti. Believe it or not, that's something to celebrate.

In September 2011, Visit Bend launched the Pillars of Art program to give tourists a close-up look at Bend's unique arts and culture scene. It's also a fun way to support emerging local artists.

Every 3 months, a different artist creates chalk drawings on the cement pillars in the lobby of the Bend Visitor Center. The artist also gets to showcase their art. Think of it like a gallery with a twist.

Check it out when you stop by the Bend Visitor Center to claim your prize for the Roundabout Art Route!

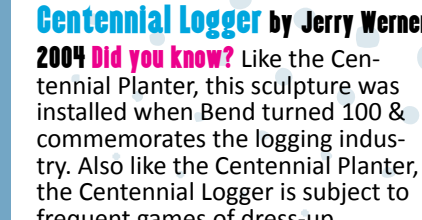
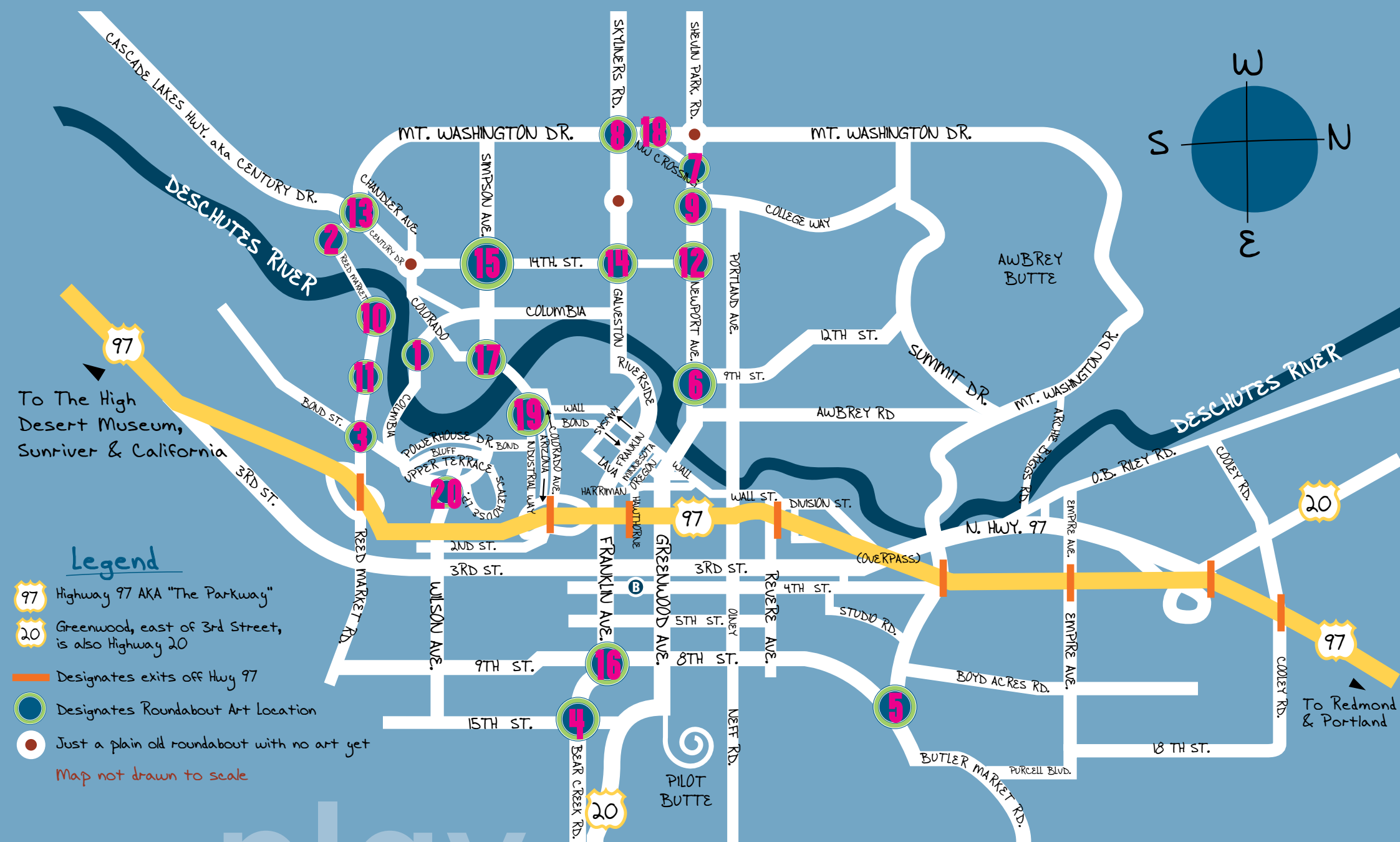

# how to play

**11 Centennial Logger by Jerry Werner 2004**  
**Did you know?** Like the Centennial Planter, this sculpture was installed when Bend turned 100 & commemorates the logging industry. Also like the Centennial Planter, the Centennial Logger is subject to frequent games of dress-up.

**Q:** Over which shoulder is the logger holding his ax?



**12 Atilt, Sundra and Garden Gate by Mel Katz 2002**  
**Did you know?** The whimsical, contemporary tone of the piece is a tribute to the sculpture's proximity to several child-related facilities nearby.

**Q:** True or false: This was the first piece of roundabout art installed in Bend?



**13 Mt. Bachelor Compass by Steve Jensen 2002**  
**Did you know?** Though the letter "S" was originally situated right on the southern compass point, it's been shifted slightly to remove it from the potential path of reckless drivers coming down Century Drive.

**Q:** What four letters make up this roundabout art?



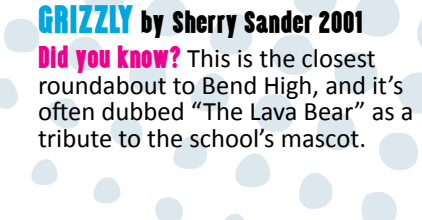
**14 Phoenix Rising by Frank Boyden 2002**  
**Did you know?** Ask Bend locals what this piece is called, and they're unlikely to know the real name. Often referred to as "The Flaming Chicken," many believe this was the 1st piece of roundabout art installed in Bend. It actually came 2nd.

**Q:** Is the phoenix flying up, down, or straight ahead?



**15 Big Ear by Joe Halko 2001**  
**Did you know?** This is the piece most commonly subjected to pranks and games of seasonal dress-up. Over the years, the deer have been outfitted in garland, cupid wings, ski outfits, and various sports team attire.

**Q:** How many deer are in this sculpture?



**16 GRIZZLY by Sherry Sander 2001**  
**Did you know?** This is the closest roundabout to Bend High, and it's often dubbed "The Lava Bear" as a tribute to the school's mascot.

**Q:** What direction is the bear facing?



**17 Redside by Miles Pepper 2001**  
**Did you know?** This is another kinetic sculpture on Bend's Roundabout Art Route, and the fish change direction with the wind. It's a tribute to the beautiful Redside Trout native to the region.

**Q:** Name another kinetic sculpture on the Roundabout Art Route?



**18 Sunrise Spirit Column by David Govedare 2001**  
**Did you know?** This piece is suggestive of a totem, with contemporary pictographs carved into the granite. Some of the images carved into the stone include deer, birds, sun, and buffalo.

**Q:** How many feathers hang from the arms of this sculpture?



**19 Cog by Dave Fox 2007**  
**Did you know?** Technically, this isn't a true roundabout since it's comprised of two smaller circles referred to as a "dogbone." Appropriate, since Bend was picked by *Dog Fancy* magazine as one of the nation's top 5 cities for dogs.

**Q:** True or false: the cogs were crucial pieces used in the operation of the old mill until the equipment was retired in 1922.



**20 Ghoat by Andy Wach & Erik Gerding 2007**  
**Did you know?** The bucket on this piece was used for dragging mud out of the river to keep the channel open for floating logs. The corrugated tin used on the sculpture came from the Planer Shed, a mammoth, four-acre building locals dubbed "the big ugly."

**Q:** What shape is formed by the two cranes?
